SPONSORSHIP CORNER:

What Sponsorship means to me:

When I came to "AA" I was confused & sick physically & emotionally & consumed with guilt & fear. I had absolutely NO idea what AA was or what recovery was about. All I knew was that when I stepped into the door there was "something" in these halls that lead me to believe that there is an element of peace & love here that I have never felt before. A woman named Mary Mac. Approached me & said she would be my sponsor— I said "well I'm not sure if I am an alcoholic or not; she stated "if you look like a duck, walk like a duck, chances are you are one" people were approaching me from all angles and had the audacity to ask if I had found a sponsor yet. That was 30 years ago. I had Mary M. for the 1st 3 years. As she said "we know how to get drunk; but you don't know how to get sober" I had one slip and came back to the program "willing as the dying can be ` to go to any lengths for my sobriety" I was told (suggestions) what meetings to go to, where to sit, who to talk to, who to call-to utilize the phone, "it's a meeting between meetings" I had to learn to trust the experience of the "old timers", the ones who went before me. One very important thing is I MUST learn to take suggestions—"when all else fails try following suggestions" suggestions like—go to meetings-I was told to go to Monday and Friday Holy Cross step meetings—Wednesday night Home group and I could choose whatever meetings I wanted on the weekend. Noon time meetings were great but I couldn't count them as one of my meetings. They said "you get real recovery at the night time meetings." one good suggestions was "stick with the winners" - also get on you knees every morning and ask for help-thank him at night if you were successful "utilize the telephone" talk to other alcoholics who are serious about recovery" many more life saving suggestions were given— such as "don't go on the track if you don't want to get hit by the train" "make gratitude list every day" Gratitude is a very important tool for recovery. As that is the first thing to go when we get "off the beam" So please don't hesitate to get a sponsor— we need the life saving guidance to get through this program One day at a time" Procrastination can be fatal"

Take My Advice—I'm Not Using It

I was feeling rather depressed and called my sponsor and found her in a similar mood. I said,"What shall I do?" At first she said, "I don't know. If you figure it out call me back." The because she is a loving person, a good friend, and has a terrific grasp of the AA program, she shifted into sponsorship gear and told me to do the following:

1. Wear life like a loose garment.
2. Don't take myself so seriously.
- 3.Count my blessings.
4. Find another alcoholic to work with.
5. Read the Big Book and go to a meeting.

The she laughed and said, "Take my advice-I'm not using it."

I called one of my sponsees, and she was also in a negative frame of mind. I addressed her problem and suggested one through five listed above. She said she had a sponsee in a melancholy mood. I proposed that I and my sponsor, she and her sponsee could form a singing group called The Depressions and sing the blues. She was not amused.

Later in the day my sponsor dropped by with another friend for coffee-what a change! She'd made a Twelfth Step call and taken another alcoholic to a detox. They recounted how she looked like ten miles of bad road, was ill and full of fear and remorse. Suddenly we were all full of gratitude and laughing at the insanity of self-pity and self-imposed depression. We remembered all the pain and confusion of our early days in Alcoholics Anonymous.

The simplicity of this program never changes-what works is constant:trust in God, clean house, and work with others.

Honor not me--Honor AA and my anonymity Bill tried to maintain a delicate balance between the spiritual need to preserve the vital Tradition of anonymity in AA and the practical impulse to bring AA to the attention of struggling alcoholics....."Alcoholics Anonymous does not publicize its leaders by name, picture or extensive personal description. This tradition, strictly binding on me, enjoins us to place principles before personalities. Such is the scope of our anonymity. To us it has immense spiritual significance, it is probably the greatest protective device against exploitation and big-shotism that AA will ever have."

"Because of AA's principle of anonymity at the public level—the most important tradition we have...to act fully in the spirit of anonymity, I would surely have to reject the creation of any marked image of myself, whatever the immediate benefits to AA might be. Let me try to make this a bit clearer:

"AA's anonymity has a three-fold purpose:

1. It makes new people more willing to approach us.
2. It prevents over-eager members from being AA public figures, with the object of them using the AA name to secure publicity and raise money for other enterprises.
3. From a spiritual point of view, it manifests the complete willingness of each of us to abandon—in the vital interest of AA as a whole the reckless pursuit of prestige and power which once wrecked so many of our lives and which so menacingly characterizes the world around us today. Nor do we dare meet the prestige temptation naked—hence, anonymity before the general public, in letter and spirit.

"Therefore it follows that anonymity requires that none of us accepts public honors or public acclaim for AA work, even though we stay technically within the minimum requirement of 'no names, no pictures.'

A few weeks ago, an AA friend called me to ask if I had the phone number of Helen, a member in good standing and regular at groups all three of us attended. He was anxious to contact her about speaking at a meeting he was leading.

I did not have her number. And no, I did not know her last name. My friend finally gave up and asked someone else.

The lady was no newcomer; I have been sitting in meetings with her for at least six or seven years. But during all that time, she has been content to give her name as Helen—plain, unadorned, "Helen"—isolated and uncommitted.

Here in the northern Virginia area (and elsewhere I understand), the practice of "first names only" has become all too common. In fact, I am tempted to start a new fellowship known as "Anonymous Anonymous," in which only first initials will be given at meetings. Newcomers could give a number. But if I did start such a group, I would have to throw out A.A.'s Eleventh Tradition.

That Tradition reads: "our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio and films."

There is nothing in the Tradition that remotely suggests anonymity at the group level. In fact, Dr. Bob, AA's co-founder, went so far as to charge those who withhold last names at AA meetings with violating the Tradition, as witness this passage from the book *Dr. Bob and the Good Old Timers*:

"In an article in the February 1969 Grapevine, D.S. of San Mateo, California, wrote that Dr. Bob commented on the Eleventh Tradition as follows:

"Since our Tradition on anonymity designates the exact level where the line should be held, it must be obvious to everyone who can read and understand the English language that to maintain anonymity at any other level is definitely a violation of this Tradition.

"The AA who hides his identity from his fellow AA by using only a given name violates the Tradition just as much as the AA who permits his name to appear in the press in connection with matters pertaining to AA."

The problem may be that too many A.A.'s fail to read the Traditions. Every meeting that I attend on the Eleventh Tradition reflects a misunderstanding on the part of a significant number of members.

Coffee, tea and fellowship

Many AA members report that their circle of AA friends has widened greatly as a result of coffee and conversation before and after meetings. Most groups depend on their members to prepare for each meeting, serve the refreshments, and do K.P. afterward. You often hear A.A. members say that they first felt "like members" when they began making coffee, helping with the chairs, doing the "dishpan" therapy. Some newcomers find that such activity relieves their shyness and makes it easier to meet and talk to other members. (p. 20 The AA group pamphlet)

What do A.A. group members do?

" I am responsible...when anyone, anywhere, reaches out for help I want the hand of A.A. always to be there and for that I am responsible." in short, when newcomers walk into our meeting rooms, we want A.A. to be there for them as it was for us-something we can do continuously only if we function as a group.

But, for a group to keep going, all kinds of jobs must be done. It is through combined efforts and ongoing commitment of group members that:

- A meeting place is provided and maintained
- Programs are arranged for the meetings.
- Contributions are collected, and properly allocated and spent
- A.A. Conference approved literature on hand
- Grapevine literature and lists of local group meetings are available
- Refreshments are often available
- Alcoholics in the area learn that A.A. is available and how to find it.
- Calls for help are answered.
- Groups problems are aired and resolved
- Continuing contact is sustained with the rest of A.A.-locally through the intergroup (central office), district and area's general service committee; nationally and internationally, through the General Service Office in New York. (p. 22-23 The AA Group Pamphlet) reprinted with permission
